Return to the Office

1. As Offices Reopen Amid Coronavirus, Workers Clash Over Masks, Cubicle Barriers and Lysol (Wall Street Journal, July 13, 2020)

When Matt Wells returned to the office in mid-April, he was surprised to see a note pinned to a colleague's cubicle urging people to keep their distance. "I thought it was an overreaction" to the coronavirus pandemic, he said. Now he has a note just like it on his cubicle. He also has strung a chain of paper clips across the opening to discourage visitors from stepping inside. (Full report requires a WSJ login, access instructions.)
